Sweetness and Devotion: Living with Diabetes and Dogs

Kathy Rudy is Professor of Women's Studies at Duke University. She holds a Master's of Divinity and PhD in Religion both from Duke University. Her early research included work on reproductive ethics, religious ethics, sexuality, and feminist theory; among publications in her early years are *Sex and the Church Gender, Sexuality, and the Transformation of Christian Ethics* (Beacon Press 1997), *Beyond Pro-Life and Pro-Choice: Moral Diversity in the Abortion Debate* (Beacon Press, 1996), as well as many scholarly articles. Her newer work focuses on animals and ethics, nature, food politics, ecology, disability theory, and ecofeminism. She is author of *Loving Animals: Toward a New Animal Advocacy* (Minnesota, 2011) and many recent essays in animal studies. Her new book is entitled *Sweetness and Devotion: Living with Diabetes and Dogs*, and explores the cultural history of both diabetes and diabetic alert dogs. She is in the process of training her own dog, Jubilee, to alert to insulin reactions.

Sue McKinney, owner of Dog Fun Forever, LLC, http://www.dogfunforever.com/Home.html offers reward-based training to humans and dogs throughout the Triangle. Sue specializes in puppy training, helping people select and train life-long family companions (and sporting dogs too) and to date has helped train more than 1000 puppies (including many shelter pups). One of Sue's subspecialties is a scent detection sport called, K9 Nose Work®. K9 Nose Work® is perfect for dogs of all ages, temperaments, and abilities. She has found it particularly helpful in building confidence in shy dogs, patience in over enthusiastic dogs, easing boredom for pet dogs, and offering a rehabilitative exercise for injured or disabled dogs. Using their natural hunting instincts, dogs search for odors that have been hidden in the environment and show their handlers exactly where the odor is located. Owners are amazed to find out how differently their dog's view of the world is from theirs and how interesting it is to learn from them.
